

SICKLES IS CHARGED SHORTAGE

New York is After Aged General Concerning \$29,246.44 of Monument Fund Money.

Albany, N. Y .--- Efforts on the part of State Comptroller William Sohmer, to obtain from General Daniel E. Sickles, U. S. A., retired, an accounting for certain funds paid to him by the state as chairman of the New York monument's commission having been unsuccessful, the comptroller has placed the matter in the hands of Attorney General Carmody. The amount unaccounted for, according to the comptroller, 1s \$29,246.44.

The New York monuments commission has charge of the erection of monuments on battlefields, and nearly \$500,000 has been appropriated to its use, of which about \$50,000 has not been expended. The members include General Sickles, General Anson G. Mc-Cook, General C. King and Represen-tative Thomas W. Bradley.

Correspondence made public Tuesday shows that efforts to obtain an accounting from General Sickles have been made from time to time since 1910. Comptroller Sohmer, on Novem-ber 21, notified General Sickles that 'under no circumstances will an ex tension of time for this settlement b granted beyond December 6,

No having heard from General Sick les by December 6, the comptroller wrote Attorney General Carmody that a shortage of \$29,246.44 existed, and referred the matter as "you may deen necessary.'

On December 7 the comptroller recelved a letter from General Sickles, asking a further brief extension of time.

"I beg your indulgence until December 20," he wrote, "when I am confi-dent I shall be able to obtain a loan on my three houses and lots on the corner of Fifth avenue and Ninth

street.




